School Guidelines

Academic Programming

The following is an explanation of school programming:

-Regular Program - focuses on learning outcomes for that grade level set by a prescribed curriculum.

-Adapted Program - retains the learning outcomes of the prescribed curriculum, but adaptations are provided so the student can participate in the program.

-Modified Program - has learning outcomes which are substantially different from the prescribed curriculum, and specifically selected to meet the student's special needs.

-Individualized Educational Plan - A student with an IEP has a plan targeting specific short and long term goals.

Assemblies

Assemblies will be held 5-6 times a year. At each assembly student awards will be presented to grades K through nine. Awards can be presented for a variety of successes. The assemblies will be a time to showcase student learning, talents and creativity.

Attendance

Regular school attendance is necessary in order to achieve success. Students who miss time from classes often find it difficult to keep up to date with their school work. When your child is absent from school, we ask that you phone the school on the day of the child's absence or send a note explaining the reason for being absent when your child returns.

Students who arrive at school late are expected to bring a note of explanation. A tracking system has been put in place by the Department of Education; therefore, all absences are recorded and kept on file. We ask students and parents to check in at the office before going to class.

If your child will be absent for part of the day or for the day it is required that a parent/guardian call the school to inform Mrs. Nicholson of the reason. We need to know if your child is out with flu like symptoms so a phone call by 9:30 a.m. would be appreciated.

Bicycle Guidelines

At the beginning of each school year, students in grades six through nine will be given a bike consent form to bring home. Only students who have parent and school permission are allowed to bring their bikes to school.

1. No riding on school property.
2. Bikes must be locked when parked.
3. Students must use student door only to enter and exit school.
4. At dismissal time, bicyclists must wait at the side door (like walkers), and wait for the duty teacher to dismiss them after the buses leave.
5. Students may not be at their bikes during the school day.
6. The school is not responsible for loss or damage to bicycles.
7. Helmets are mandatory.
8. No motorbikes permitted.

The school reserves the right to forbid any or all students to ride their bicycles to school, should these rules not be followed, or if the bicycles become a nuisance or safety hazard.

Book Policy

Each student is issued text books at the beginning of the school year. New books should be covered and not marked on. If a text book is lost or damaged it is the responsibility of the parent to cover these expenses.

Library books belonging to our school library are the responsibility of the borrower and must be replaced at cost if lost.

Bussing

Our buses will be driven by Lornie Hughes (#184) , Brian Duffy (#88) and Wayne Murnaghan (#118). Buses arrive at the school each morning around 8:45 a.m. and depart each afternoon at 2:55 p.m.

All bussing concerns should be addressed to the school principal. Should your child have to travel on an alternate bus, a note must be sent on that day. This note should be shown to the regular driver, the alternate bus driver and the school principal. Please note that our buses are operating to capacity and there is no guarantee space will be available to accommodate such requests. Requests will be granted at the end of the school day and will be based on the availability of seats due to absenteeism.

Bus Guidelines

1. Be on time at the designated bus stop.
2. Wait for the bus at the designated stop. Stand well back from the road. Pupils should line up while waiting for the bus.
3. Board the bus one at a time and go directly to their proper seats.
4. Obey the bus driver's directions and help the driver to assure safety at all times.
5. While the bus is moving, stay seated.
6. Do not shout or make loud noises or otherwise distract the driver.
7. Head, arms and hands must be kept inside the bus.
8. Help keep the bus clean by not eating or drinking on the bus (safety issue e.g. peanut allergies.)
9. Older children should be helpful to small children.
10. When getting off the bus, move quickly away from the side of the bus.

To cross the road, walk 10 paces ahead of the bus and wait for a signal from the driver. Look both ways before crossing and walk, don't run. With such a very large number of children being bussed to and from school each day, parents, drivers, teachers and students all have very important roles to play to make sure our children get to and from school safely. The teachers and bus drivers consider proper behaviour on the bus to be of the utmost importance.

Donagh Regional School will follow the Eastern School District Policy with regards to discipline problems on the buses. If a child is reported as being a discipline problem on the bus, then he/she will be given a warning, a letter will be sent home and a call may be made to the parents. If he/she continues to be a discipline problem, he/she will lose the privilege of riding on the school bus for a period of time. However, incidents deemed to be of a serious nature can result in an automatic suspension without a warning or letter being sent home previous, (i.e fighting).

For safety reasons, students are expected to follow a bussing code of conduct. This code of conduct includes the following:

- Students are expected to sit in and remain in assigned seats.
- Students will respect others and property.
- Students will maintain appropriate behaviour.

Dress Code

Donagh Regional wishes to promote an atmosphere of respect. Students and teachers are expected to wear appropriate clothing to school. After consulting with our Home & School, taking into account the changing fashion trends, and what is appropriate in a school setting, the following regulations will be in effect at this school:

- Skirts, dresses and shorts must be finger tip (mid thigh) length or longer when standing comfortably straight.

- Student's clothing must not depict messages, whether written or picture form, which are profane, demeaning or promote illegal or inappropriate activity, or promote the use of alcohol or drugs.

- Clothing that will be considered inappropriate includes spaghetti straps, halter tops, tube tops, muscle shirts and tank tops. Clothing must cover the stomach area and no undergarments can be showing.

- For safety reasons, appropriate footwear, which covers all parts of the foot, must be worn in the woodworking, metals and cooking areas of the Industrial Arts/Home Economics areas. Appropriate footwear includes shoes such as sneakers which provide total coverage.

- This dress code pertains to all school activities including field trips, dances, extra-curricular activities, etc.

- The administration reserves the right to define the term "inappropriate." Students failing to comply will be required to change into appropriate clothing before entering class.

↔It is important that students have indoor and outdoor shoes. We are also requesting that all indoor shoes have white or gum bottoms. These guidelines help to promote a clean school.

Electronic Communication

Parents who are wishing to receive school notices and newsletters electronically, please contact the school office. Our goal, when possible, is to eliminate as much paper as possible between school and home. A notice will go out at the beginning of each school year to gather this information.

Fiddle Program

Please Note—the following will result in removal from the Fiddle Program:

1. Inappropriate behaviour:
Parents will receive a first phone call
Parents will receive a second phone call if no improvement
Parents will receive a third phone call if still no improvement
At this time, the student will be asked to show a 100% improvement in behaviour and attitude within a 2-4 week period. If no improvement occurs, the student will be removed from the program.
2. Five consecutive missed Fiddle classes (the fiddle is being forgotten at home) results in immediate dismissal.
Parents will receive a phone call after the third missed class.
If two more consecutive classes are missed because of a forgotten fiddle, the fifth phone call will result in immediate dismissal.
**This does not include sick days or days absent.*
3. Deliberate destruction of the instrument will result in immediate dismissal.

Field Trips

Letters and permission forms will be sent home to parents before each field trip. Forms must be signed prior to any off school property activity. Consent for activities considered low risk is obtained at the beginning of the year and will be recognized as consent for all low risk activities throughout the school year. For high risk activities (e.g. skating, basketball, soccer etc) consent must specifically be given for each high risk activity. If district buses are required, a request for travel fees may be noted in the parent letter.

Specialty Days—Wednesdays (To Be Announced)

We will not be accepting cheques for food items. It will be at the discretion of the classroom teacher if orders will be taken beyond each school week. All food and drinks will be consumed within the classroom settings.

Gym Clothes

We are requesting that parents label all gym shoes and clothing.

Students in grades five through nine are to change clothing for physical education classes. Shorts and t-shirts or gym suits are recommended.

Home Economics and Fine Arts

Home Economics and Fine Arts give junior high students the opportunity to develop a wide variety of skills. These classes use consumable items that can become quite costly. We are requesting \$40.00 annually from each junior high student, to supplement the costs of these programs.

Newsletter

A school newsletter is published and distributed the beginning of every month. Please check your child's backpack for weekly and bi-weekly notices. The newsletter will also be posted on our website. *Our school web site is* www.edu.pe.ca/donagh

Peanut Restrictions

Due to students in our school who have been diagnosed with Anaphylaxis, no food containing peanuts and/or peanut products are allowed.

Playground Areas

Playground areas are designated for grades K-2, 3-5, and 6-9. To maximize safe fun activities for all, students are to only use their assigned play areas.

Public Health Nurse

Scent -Free Policy

The Eastern School District has adopted a “Scent-Free” policy for all schools. As a result no perfumes, scented spray deodorants, hair spray, etc. are allowed.

School Closure Due to Storms

If a storm prohibits the opening of school for the day, an announcement from Eastern School District will be made over the local radio stations generally before 8:00 a.m. It may be that only a particular group of schools could be closed; for this purpose Donagh Regional is considered a member of the **Charlottetown Rural Family of Schools**.

If a storm develops during the day every attempt is made to have students bussed home before the storm makes travelling dangerous. An announcement will be made over the local radio stations as to the time of school closing.

It is extremely important that parents have arrangements made for days when a storm comes up and students are sent home, especially if the parents will not be at home. In early fall we will send home a form for you to complete indicating alternate arrangements for your child should a storm come up during the day.

School Counsellor

Counselling Services will be provided on Days 2 and 5. The school’s counsellor can be contacted other days through the school. The Eastern School District psychologists are also available and can be contacted through the Eastern School District Office at 368-6990.

School Lockers

Each student at Donagh Regional School will be assigned a locker. If your child is using a personal lock, the combination or a copy of the master key must be given to the classroom teacher. All school lockers are the ownership of Donagh Regional School.

Six-Day Cycle

Our school, as other schools in the Eastern School District operates on a six-day cycle. The cycle continues from Day 1 to Day 6 then back to Day 1 again uninterrupted, unless all schools in Eastern School District are closed (i.e. storms). The major benefit of the six-day cycle is so students will not miss time from a particular subject should the system be shut down.

Student Insurance

All students are covered by the P.E.I. School Accident Insurance Program. No cost to students. Please contact the school for further information or go to the Eastern School District's Website: www.edu.pe.ca/esd.

Student Medication

Parents wishing to have a teacher administer a prescribed medication to their child must first complete a Request Form and have it forwarded to the school. These forms can be obtained at the school office. Parents should provide the teacher with written instruction of medical use.

Technology

At the beginning of each school year Acceptable Use Contracts will be sent home with targeted students. These forms must be signed and returned to the school's office.

Computers located in our computer lab, library and classrooms are available for student use. Although we encourage the use of this technology, its use is confined within the following regulations:

1. All students must sign in before use.
2. Class projects receive priority over other use.
3. E-mail use may be monitored through Pegasus by staff.
4. Chat lines are not to be accessed.
5. Hot mail accounts are not to be accessed. Our school account is public. Private mail is to be done on private accounts at home.
6. Games must be approved by teacher.
7. Printing must be teacher approved.

Failure to follow these guidelines may result in the loss of computer use privileges.

Visitors

As part of our Safe School Initiative, we are requesting that all parents and visitors please check in at the office. You will receive a visitor's tag that you must wear while you are in the building. It is important that our students can identify who has permission to be in the school. Please help to keep our school safe.

Volunteers

We welcome the help of parents or friends of the school willing to share some time to benefit our students. If interested, please contact the school, we'd be pleased to hear from you.

Student Rights And Responsibilities Discipline

Student Rights

We believe that all students of Donagh Regional School have the right to:

- Learn and achieve in an environment free from disruption.
- Be treated with courtesy, dignity, and respect.
- Be safe and secure.
- To expect that their personal property will not be destroyed or stolen.

Student Responsibilities

We believe that with the rights of our students, there are responsibilities. We expect that all students will:

- Be truthful and honest.
- Follow directions from all school personnel.
- Not interfere with the learning of others.
- Refrain from physical or verbal assaults of others.
- Not use foul language or gestures.
- Attend school regularly and on time.
- Complete all assignments.
- Follow the policies on smoking and the use of drugs and alcohol. (*continued*)

Student Responsibilities *Continuation*

- Move through the school in an orderly fashion.
- Leave the school promptly when dismissed.
- Not bring weapons (real or toy) to school.
- Stay out of the parking lot.
- Follow District guidelines regarding electronic devices.

- Leave gum, energy drinks and sunflower seeds at home.
- Remove their hat when entering the classroom and keep it off while in the school.
- Dress appropriately.
- Remove footwear upon entering the school.

School Action Regarding Student Behavior

Prevention Activities May Include

- Implementing student programs such as: Self-Esteem Building and Conflict Resolution.
- Utilization of community resources such as R.C.M.P. - Probation Services, Mental Health–counseling, Child and Family Services, Etc.
- Designing activities for the students during recess, lunch and after school.
- Recognizing positive student behavior such as: daily recognition by school staff, assembly awards, recognizing random acts of kindness, etc.

Intervention Procedures May Include

- Action by (in order): School Staff, School Administration, District Administration, Board of Trustees.
- Intervention procedures will involve parents and peers when appropriate.

Postvention Programs May Include

- Assessment and counseling
- Behavioral plans
- Mediation (may involve parents, counselors, others)
- Referral to an appropriate outside agency
- Placement in alternative programs

➤ ***Consequences For Students May Include***

- Conference
- Time-Out
- Removal of privileges
- Detentions
- Parent-Teacher meetings
- Restitution
- Suspensions: in school, out of school
- Expulsion

The above list represents a range of responses and it should be noted that the order of the list is not prioritized. On any one incident, the response by the school may include more than one of the items.

School Policy On Violence

Violence or threats of violence will never be acceptable. The school will always intervene in such cases. A specific intervention response is not indicated in this definition.

What Is Included In This Policy?

This policy targets deliberate physical violence. Included under this policy are such acts as assault, fighting, threats of physical harm, and unsuccessful attempts to do harm to another individual. It applies to violent acts against students and staff. All incidents are fully investigated within the limits of time and circumstances. Often this will involve the questioning of witnesses. In the end, the person conducting the investigation must make a judgment call on the situation.

The School's Response

The following list represents a range of responses used by the school. The school will respond and intervene in the matter. The following list represents a range of responses and it should be noted that the order of the list is not prioritized. On any one incident, the response by the school may include more than one of the items:

1. Conference with the student and/or reprimand.
2. Telephone call to parents.
3. Detention(s).
4. Mandatory parent meeting.
5. Alternate recess (only for problems that occur at recess).
6. Counseling referral.
7. Creation of a behavioral management program, usually involving the counsellor and possibly District staff. (*continued*)

The School's Response *Continuation*

8. In-school suspension (isolates student for specified time.)
9. Referrals to District and/or other agency specialist personnel.
10. Out-of-school suspension (length dependent on severity of incident and past record.)
11. Out-of-school suspension with recommendation for expulsion.
12. Severe clause - for very serious acts of violence the student may be excluded from school for an indefinite time until a plan of action is determined.

School action plans directed at violent acts among the student body is intended for the safety of the children attending the school. The goal is not to remove students from the school system. The bottom line may be reached for a small number of non-responsive students. In such cases, the general welfare of the school population must be considered.

USE OF ELECTRONIC DEVICES/ESD POLICY–SCHOOL BAN

In keeping with the Eastern School District Policy on use of electronic devices, Donagh Regional will follow this policy. No electronic devices will be allowed for use in school/busses during the regular school day. Please see policy.

<p>The Eastern School District Administration Regulations Use of Electronic Devices Effective April 12, 2007</p>
--

The Eastern School District believes in creating and maintaining a sense of safety and privacy for students and staff in the school setting. We recognize that consideration must be given to the legitimate uses of electronic devices which have provided an increased sense of safety and security for students and parents. However, the ordinary use of these devices can be extremely disruptive. The interruptions and distractions caused by electronic devices can interfere with the educational process and a teacher's ability to conduct class in an orderly fashion .

With the continued expansion and wide range of use of communication technology devices, implications have arisen related to safety, privacy, and the intrusive nature of such devices. Therefore it is important to govern the use of these devices to ensure the safety of staff and students as well as the teaching/learning environment in the Eastern School District.

This regulation applies to personal electronic devices and is understood to include:

- cell phones, video/camera cell phones,
- personal digital assistants (PDA's), i.e. digital organizers such as palm pilots, wireless PDA/telecommunications hybrid devices such as the Blackberry, pagers)..... *continued*

Policy-Use Of Electronic Devices (*continuation*)

- any camera or video camera,
- digital and conventional sound recording devices (digital voice recorders, I Pods, dictaphones etc),
- personal entertainment devices such as CD/DVD MP3 players, miniature TV's,
- eavesdropping devices,
- laptops, and the like.

It is also understood to include newly developed devices employing any form of technology that provides any device with similar image taking, eavesdropping/listening and communications capabilities.

This regulation applies to students, staff, parents/guardians, volunteers, service providers and visitors in all Eastern School District schools.

This regulation does not prohibit the use of an assistive device by a special needs student where the use has been authorized by the student's individualized education plan or by the school principal or designate.

Staff will notify students and parents/guardians in cases of emergency.

For the purpose of this regulation, authorized use of electronic devices refers to situations where permission is given by the Principal or designate to use such devices. Students are prohibited from the unauthorized use of electronic devices (above) in schools at all times. This includes classes, corridors, offices, libraries, cafeterias, labs and specifically, areas where there is an increased expectation of privacy such as change/locker rooms and washrooms. Similarly, unauthorized use on the school bus may cause the driver to divert his/her attention unnecessarily from driving or the overall management and supervision of the bus and its passengers and this is likewise prohibited.

When not authorized for use, all electronic devices must be turned off and out of sight while in the school building.

Staff may confiscate any electronic device - unless authorized for use - that is visible, that rings or beeps, or is otherwise in use in the school building or on any bus runs. If an electronic device is confiscated, it may be returned to the student at the end of the day or it may be held by the school until a parent is able to pick it up. (*Continued*)

Policy-Use Of Electronic Devices (*continuation*)

Cell phones, camera phones, and digital cameras may only be used outside the building. If cameras/camera phones are used on school grounds, students must be aware that people being photographed must give consent. It is never acceptable to post pictures on a website. Where a student uses the internet or other technologies to threaten, harass, or demean another member(s) of the school community, the student may be subject to disciplinary procedures. Parents may be contacted. Police may be contacted.

Electronic devices with communication capabilities (cell phones, digital cameras, etc.) may not be carried or in the possession of students during examinations or other types of assessments. Any student found using electronic devices during examinations or other types of assessments will have the device confiscated and may face any consequences related to cheating.

This regulation does not prevent the use of surveillance devices authorized by the District or Principal that may be used from time to time for safety and security purposes.

Eastern School District personnel are not responsible for lost, stolen, or damaged electronic devices.

The Caring Places To Learn Policy

The Eastern School District's "Caring Places To Learn" policy is a comprehensive policy designed to ensure that schools in the Eastern District provide a healthy, safe, and supportive working and learning environment for every student and staff member. The "Caring Places To Learn" policy is an "umbrella" policy which supports each school's own policies and practices in this area.

Countless personal interactions occur in Eastern District schools every day, and these interactions are the focus of this policy. The policy guides the way people in our school communities treat each other, and the expectations for behaviour for all members of the school community are similar: that we will demonstrate regard, concern, and respect for each other in all our interactions--both inside and outside the classroom--and that we will respect the unique differences and worth of every individual.

Achieving and maintaining this positive climate is the responsibility of everyone involved in education in Eastern District schools--students, parents, teachers, support staff and trustees. There are high expectations for all members of school communities, and these expectations are met and exceeded daily on a regular basis. We continually strive to work hard to make sure that our schools are inclusive, supportive, and healthy for all.

The "Caring Places To Learn" policy covers such specific areas as verbal abuse, violence, bullying, discrimination, sexual abuse, threats, trespassing, and weapons. Within these areas, the policy dictates what steps should be taken when allegations of violations of this policy are made.
