### **GENERAL SCHOOL INFORMATION**

- **CARING PLACES TO LEARN POLICY**

The Eastern School District's *Caring Places to Learn* policy is a comprehensive policy designed to ensure that schools in the Eastern District provide a healthy, safe, and supportive working and learning environment for every student and staff member. The *Caring Places to Learn* policy is an "umbrella" policy which supports each school's own policies and practices in this area.

Countless personal interactions occur every day, and these interactions are the focus of this policy. The policy guides the way people in our school communities treat each other, and the expectations for behaviour for all members of the school community are similar: that we will demonstrate regard, concern, and respect for each other in all our interactions--both inside and outside the classroom--and that we will respect the unique differences and worth of every individual.

Achieving and maintaining this positive climate is the responsibility of everyone involved in education--students, parents, teachers, support staff, and trustees. There are high expectations for all members of school communities, and these expectations are met and exceeded daily on a regular basis. We continually strive to work hard to make sure that our school is inclusive, supportive, and healthy for all.

The *Caring Places to Learn* policy covers such specific areas as verbal abuse, violence, bullying, discrimination, sexual abuse, threats, trespassing, and weapons. Within these areas, the policy dictates what steps should be taken when allegations of violations of this policy are made. These allegations may involve student to student incidents, student to staff incidents, staff to student incidents, and staff to staff incidents.

Parents, in particular, are encouraged to inform us immediately about situations which would negatively affect the school's healthy and supportive environment. Sometimes parents are reluctant to contact the school when students may be having a difficult time with a situation, and the situation worsens. We can't guarantee that we can "fix" every situation, but if the school knows about problems early, we can often take steps to prevent the problem from becoming worse.

Parents are encouraged to become involved with their school to help maintain its safe and caring atmosphere. It's a responsibility of the entire school community.

- **PROMOTION POLICY**

For 2011-2012, Progress Reports are sent home four times over the year. Parent-Teacher interviews will be held twice a year.

According to ESD Policy, in order to be promoted, minimum requirements, unless modified, will be 50% in each subject and an average of 60%. Consideration will be given to placement of students who do not meet promotion requirements. Students on an Adapted Program (changes in format, instructional strategies and/or assessment procedures that do not change the learning outcomes of the curriculum) will be promoted with adaptations documented on the student's file and/or transcript. Students on a Modified Program (changes in the prescribed curriculum to meet a student's special needs) will be placed with details of the modified course included in the student's file/transcript.

Students with an overall average of 85% will receive an Honours Certificate at the end of the school year.

- **COUNSELLING SERVICES**

The school counsellor offers personal counselling, peer support and counselling, career counselling, and referrals to outside agencies.

Students and parents are encouraged to consult the counsellor about academic, social, and personal problems by making an appointment at the counsellor's office, by phoning Linda Thistle-McKenna at 838-0862 or by e-mail at [ltmckenna@edu.pe.ca](mailto:ltmckenna@edu.pe.ca).

- **ACCIDENT PROCEDURES**

If an accident occurs during school hours, the student will be taken to the office. For precautionary measures, the office personnel will have the student transported to the hospital or clinic and an attempt will be made to contact the home. It is the parent's/ guardian's responsibility to ensure emergency information forms have been filled out properly and returned to the school via the students **as soon as possible**.

- **SCHOOL CANCELLATIONS AND CLOSURES**

Parents are urged to listen to local radio stations for announcements pertaining to late buses, early dismissals, or school cancellations. If school is cancelled, all extra-curricular activities are cancelled for that day.

- **STUDENT FEES**

Each student is expected to pay a \$15 student fee. Parents with one child or more in the school pay \$15 for the first child and \$10 for each child thereafter. Monies are used for student activities and to cover extra program expenses.

- **LOCKERS**

Students are issued a locker and a lock at the beginning of the year. **THEY ARE EXPECTED TO KEEP THEIR LOCKERS LOCKED AT ALL TIMES AND SHOULD BE TREATED RESPECTFULLY.** If the lock is lost, students are to pay an \$8 replacement fee. Students must use the combination locks provided by the school. No other locks are permitted. **STUDENTS SHOULD NOT INFORM OTHER STUDENTS OF THE COMBINATION.** Students are expected to use their lockers before homeroom in the morning, at break time, and at lunch time. They are not to use their lockers any other time during the day.

- **READING PERIOD**

Students will engage in an uninterrupted sustained silent reading period each morning from 8:40 - 9:00. Students are expected to read at this time. This is not a time for doing homework. No pencil work is to be done. Students are expected to bring appropriate books/magazines from home or from the library. Novels may be read, but textbook reading is intended for home study.

- **MORNING BREAK**

Students are permitted a ten minute break in the morning. They are not permitted to leave school property during this time. Students must use this time to travel to High School for Industrial Arts, go to the washroom, use lockers to exchange books, and to have a snack.

- **SNACK BREAK**

Students are not permitted to consume food in the school at any time other than during the morning break and at noon. Students are encouraged to bring a nutritious snack and are required to dispose of all waste in a responsible manner. A Student Store will operate at the school with a selection of snacks available. Drink machines may be used before and after school, during morning break, and during lunch time. Canteen items may also be consumed at these times. Drinks may not be purchased during class time as the machines are quite noisy while dispensing. Microwaves and toasters are available for student use.

- **TEXTBOOKS**

Students are expected to maintain the condition of the textbooks for the year. If a textbook is lost, the student must pay for the lost book before a new one can be issued. Textbooks must be returned to the teacher in June. If a textbook is not returned or is damaged, the student will be charged for the book before he/she will receive a report card.

- **AWARDS**

Student awards will be presented at the end of the school year. These include participating certificates for students involved in extra-curriculars and academic recognition for subject excellence.

- **JACKETS AND HATS**

**Students are required to remove jackets, hats and kitbags before the 8:30 bell and store them in their lockers.** Unless a student needs to make an outdoor trip to the high school, jackets and hats should be left in the school lockers provided.

- **ELECTRONIC DEVICES POLICY**

In Accordance with the Eastern School District's policy on electronic devices in the school, Montague Intermediate staff expects students to understand that, although phones and other electronic devices can be an integral part of our modern world and part of the connection between home and school, their proper use is of the utmost importance and so will be regulated. The spirit of this policy is to entrust students with having control over their phones or other electronic devices during the school day for responsible use and to follow prudent and respectful practices. This means NOT using these devices during classroom time for either communication or entertainment purposes without teacher permission. Students who do not comply with the spirit of this policy will have their electronic devices taken for the day. If there are repeat offenders, parents will be asked to take part in escalating disciplinary action. If there is total disregard for the policy, students are subject to removal from school based on the ESD Safe Schools Policy.

Our understanding is that students will have and will use cell phones, ipods, and other electronic technology when appropriate and with permission. Electronic devices may be used at lunch time if the purpose is in accordance with the ESD's Safe Schools Policy. On field trips, when students participate with after school sport teams, at dances and other similar activities where contacting parents is an issue, when photographing friends, and/or occupying oneself during "down time," students may have permission to use electronic devices. Teachers may also request that an electronic device be part of a student's adaptation in the classroom or on the bus. At all times, electronic devices should be out of sight unless otherwise approved by a staff member. This does not mean that students must store all electronic devices in their lockers, but it is highly recommended for safety, security, and the elimination of possible misuse.

- **TYLENOL/MEDICATIONS**

Tylenol and/or other headache remedies **will not be dispensed** at the school. Students who suffer from repeated headaches should see a doctor and arrange, if necessary, with parents/doctors for their own supply of appropriate medication.

- **INDUSTRIAL ARTS / HOME EC. / TECHNOLOGY ARTS**

Students at all grade levels will rotate through industrial arts, technology arts, and home economics.

Industrial arts classes are taught to give students some hands-on experience using various machines, tools, and materials. Safety is stressed at all times and proper safe use of all tools and machines, as demonstrated, is expected of students.

The technology arts program will consist of 25 hour modules with hands-on technology application. This has proven to be a very high interest and worthwhile program in the field of technology.

The program in food and clothing consists of basic food and clothing applications with some high technology application in sewing.

- **MUSIC**

We offer instrumental music to Grades 7, 8, and 9 students as an optional course. Students who wish to enroll in instrumental music must understand they are making a commitment to the program for the entire year.

- **HOMEWORK**

Students are expected to complete their homework on a regular day-to-day basis. The only valid reason for coming to school without homework completed is illness. **Students are expected to phone a classmate to learn of assignments.** In the event of an extended illness, arrangements should be made through the office. Teachers use the class pages on the MIS web page to post homework and students and parents can access this at [www.edu.pe.ca/montaqueint](http://www.edu.pe.ca/montaqueint).

- **PHYSICAL EDUCATION**

Physical education is an integral part of the school's program and is part of the curriculum for all grades 7, 8 and 9 students. The following guidelines have been established:

**CLOTHING** - Students are required to have a change of clothes (shorts or sweat pants, t-shirt or sweat shirt, sneakers) at all times to participate/use the gymnasium facility, including intramurals. A change of footwear or complete cleaning of outdoor sneakers is required. Hats are not to be worn in the gymnasium but may be worn for outside phys. ed. classes for protection from the sun. The first time a healthy student is unprepared for class, the student will receive a warning. Unprepared students will be subject to a mark penalty. A second occurrence will result in parent notification by phone or letter. Students who are chronically unprepared for class will be dealt with on an individual basis.

**NON-PARTICIPATION** - Students who have a note regarding injury/illness preceding participation are to present the note to the physical education instructor at the beginning of the period.

**LOCKS/LOCKERS** - Students are encouraged to take responsibility for belongings. Students can use the half lockers in physical education area during class time, only. Items left in the change room will be placed in "lost and found".

**VALUABLES** - Valuables should not be taken to the gymnasium area.

**FOOD & DRINK** - Food and drink are **NOT** permitted in the gymnasium area.

**SUPERVISION** - Students/Athletes are not to use the facility unless under supervision of coach or instructor.

- **LIBRARY**

The library at Montague Intermediate School has a very good selection of books and materials for student and teacher use. All materials must be signed out and returned when due. Students who lose or damage books will be required to pay for them. We ask that parents help us maintain this resource by urging their children to return material promptly and handle them carefully.

- **GRADE NINE CLOSING**

There will be a recognition of achievement for our grade nine students on June 25, 2012 during which certificates and awards will be presented.

### **ADMINISTRATIVE POLICIES**

- **ATTENDANCE**

Regular attendance is essential. Students who attend school on a regular basis build better connections with their teachers and peers, and in turn, will experience more success in their academics. We suggest that students should miss **no more than ten days of school** during the school year unless there are extenuating circumstances. If parents are concerned about their child's attendance, they should contact the school at 838-0860

- **EXTENDED ILLNESS/ABSENCE**

Students absent due to an extended illness should contact the school to make arrangements for work to be sent home and/or extra help. More than ten, non-illness absences over the school year are considered excessive and will impede your child's learning.

- **STUDENTS LEAVING SCHOOL DURING THE SCHOOL DAY**

Students leaving school for any reason during the school day **must** present a note to their home room teacher between 8:40 and 8:50 a.m. and report to the office before leaving the school.

- **FULL DAY ABSENCES**

**Upon a student's return to school, he/she must present a note to the homeroom teacher stating the reason for the absence.** If the student does not have a note, the home room teacher will contact the home.

- **LATE ASSIGNMENT POLICY**

Students are expected to pass in their assignments on the due date. Penalty for late assignments will be as follows:

1 day late = Not Handed In (NHI) = 0 as assigned by Students Achieve.

**1st intervention** : Contact is made with home. If work comes in the next day, it is marked as 75% or less (if the work would have received less than 75% had it been handed in on time).

**2nd intervention**: If the work does not come in, students are referred to Lunch Time Work Period from 11:55am - 12:15pm in the library and continue to come until the work is complete and handed in. The assignment will then be marked as 75% or less (if the work would have received less than 75% had it been handed in on time).

**3rd intervention**: If student refuses to complete the work, he/she is referred to administration for further intervention.

Students who are absent on the day their assignment is due must bring a note from their parent/guardian along with their assignment to their subject teacher. Otherwise, the assignment will be marked late. Extensions will be granted at the discretion of the teacher.

- **CROSS-CURRICULAR ACADEMIC PERIOD**

The cross-curricular academic period will occur daily from 2:40pm - 3:00pm. Students are expected to complete any work assigned in their classes at this time.

- **LATE STUDENTS**

The school day starts at 8:30am. **Students arriving after 8:30am are to report to the office and are expected to present a note explaining the lateness. Students are expected to be on time for all classes and school-related activities. Students must also be on time after lunch and be in home rooms by 12:35pm.** Individual subject teachers will track tardiness and report to the home room teacher. Home room teachers will notify parent(s)/guardian(s) if students are consistently late. If the problem persists, referral will be made to administration or school counsellor for follow-up action. Parents/guardians should be aware that repeated lateness will result in students having to make up time missed from class and will result in disciplinary action.

- **ILLNESS (During School Hours)**

A student who becomes ill during the school day is required to report to the office. The office staff will attempt to contact the home or a neighbour/relative to make arrangements to have the student transported home. A student who becomes sick over the lunch hour should have a parent/guardian contact the school at lunch time.

- **NOON DETENTIONS**

At teacher's/administration's discretion, students may be assigned detention(s). Repeated failure to report to assigned detentions will

result in a suspension and possible loss of extra-curricular privileges, including dances.

- **PHYSICAL ALTERCATIONS**

Physical altercations at school and/or during the school day will be dealt with by the administration and will result in students receiving a suspension from school which includes all extra-curriculars. Students involved in instigating physical altercations will be subject to disciplinary action.

- **TRUANCY POLICY**

Students are expected to attend school on a regular basis. The only valid reasons for absences are illness, medical appointments, or family needs. Students who are absent from school for any of the above reasons should return with a note from home. If this does not happen, the home room teacher will contact the parents by phone. If the absence was without approval of parents, consequences will be determined. For a first time offence, students will be excluded from the next school dance. If there is a repeat offence of absence without permission, it will be dealt with by the administration in consultation with parents. Organized truancies, which could greatly detract from the overall operation of the school, may result in the automatic loss of a subsequent school dance, intermediate or senior high, and the loss of year end "Fun Day" activities.

- **DANCE REGULATIONS**

Montague Intermediate dances are for grades 7-9 only. These dances will take place in the gym from 7:00 to 9:15 p.m. for grades 7 and 8 students and 7:00 to 9:30 p.m. for grade nines. The doors will be open from 7:00 until 7:30. Nobody will be admitted after 7:30 unless prior arrangements are made with administration. **Only Montague Intermediate School students who have paid applicable student fees and who have a full day attendance on the day of the dance are eligible to attend, unless otherwise approved. Once students enter the dance, they cannot leave until the dance is over and/or a parent/guardian comes to the door to pick them up.** While at the dance, students will be responsible for following the same code of behaviour that is demanded during the school day. Students guilty of gross misconduct (e.g., using or possessing alcohol or illegal drugs; willful

damage to property; fighting; etc.) may find that they lose all extra-curricular privileges for up to one school year.

- **EXAMINATIONS**

All grade nine students are expected to write formal examinations, worth up to 30% of their first term mark, in English, Math, Science, and Social Studies, when scheduled. As well, all grade 9 students will write a common math

evaluation in May. If a student is absent, the parent/guardian must phone the school before the examination is scheduled to be written. The day the student returns to school, he/she must make arrangements with the office to write the examination. Failure to do so could result in the student receiving a failure in that subject. Grade 7 and 8 students do not write formal examinations.

- **TELEPHONE / PAY PHONE**

Students must use the office phones to make arrangements for permission to leave school. In such cases, a staff person must give permission to the student to use the phone, and verification by a staff member must be heard from a parent/guardian. **Otherwise, students should use the pay phone in the downstairs hallway. All other arrangements must be made prior to leaving home in the morning.** Parents/guardians phoning the school to get in contact with a student may leave a message which will be relayed to the student. **If there is an emergency, students will be called from class.**

- **SCHOOL OPENING/CLOSING**

School doors will not open until 8:00 a.m. and will remain open until 4:30 p.m. only for those students staying for extra-curriculars and extra help.

### **CODE OF CONDUCT**

- **MONTAGUE INTERMEDIATE SCHOOL BEHAVIOUR CODE**

A pupil shall.....

a) exercise self discipline; b) accept such discipline as would be exercised by a kind, firm, and judicious parent; c) attend classes punctually and regularly; d) be courteous to fellow pupils and obedient and courteous to teachers; e) be clean in person and habits; f) show respect for school property. **Fighting will not be tolerated and will result in a suspension from school for up to five days.**

Parents play a vital role in developing student behaviour and conduct. It is our expectation that parents.....

a) be aware of the school's code of conduct; b) work with the school to resolve student behaviour issues when they affect their children; c) cooperate with the school's or district's recommended course of action for the student; d) model appropriate behaviour and language for their children. All parents/guardians are reminded that they are subject to the school's code of conduct, as are all students and staff.

- **CARE OF SCHOOL PROPERTY**

Students are expected to respect school facilities and equipment. Any student who damages school property will be held responsible for

replacement costs and disciplinary action may also be taken. The school has the option to pursue vandalism charges with the RCMP.

- **DRESS**

Students at Montague Intermediate come to school appropriately dressed. This indicates a sense of pride that the students and parents have in the school. Rapidly changing styles and fashions make it impossible to suggest a definite standard of dress. School is a place distinctly different from a beach, for example, and we request discretion in the choice of t-shirts (especially wording and suggestive pictures), any see-through materials, skirts/shorts shorter than arms' length (finger tip rule), bra straps showing, any underwear showing, rolling down jeans, and rolling up shirts. Generally speaking, all students should continue to dress in a manner appropriate to the educational goals and activities at our school. At times, special days will be announced and specific dress will be requested, i.e., Hat Day, Summer Day, etc.

- **ALCOHOL AND NON-MEDICAL DRUGS**

The use of and/or possession of alcohol or non-medical drugs on school property or sanctioned school functions off school property is strictly prohibited. Violation of this rule may result in a suspension from extra-curricular activities and will result in a suspension from school. Violators may be required to undergo an addiction assessment and may be charged under the law.

- **BUS BEHAVIOUR**

Students are expected to be on their best behaviour while travelling on the school bus to and from school. It is important that students adhere to all rules and regulations as posted on the school bus. Failure to act in an appropriate manner may result in a suspension from bus travel for varying amounts of time.

- **BUSES (TRAVELLING ON ANOTHER BUS)**

Students who wish to travel on a bus other than their regular bus in order to visit a friend after school, must have a note from home and must bring the note to the office in the morning.

- **SMOKING**

Students are not permitted to smoke in the school or on school property. Students who are caught smoking in the school or on school property will be suspended for one day for a first offence. Subsequent offenses will result in additional suspensions and the loss of extra-curricular privileges, including dances.

- **EXTRA-CURRICULAR SPORTS**

Extra-curricular coaching is done on a voluntary basis. Regular attendance and a sustained effort in academics is a prerequisite for being on a school team. The staff, in conjunction with the principal and the athletic director, may remove a student from a team at any time and for any length of time. In most cases, this is very detrimental to a team so students/athletes must make every effort to avoid this situation. Students receiving the privilege of playing on an extra-curricular or scholastic team are expected to be respectful and courteous toward their coach(es), fellow players, and opponents. They will be expected to have the necessary uniforms and equipment at all times and to ensure that Montague Intermediate School is well regarded in both the community and in school circles. The coach or team designate will travel with the team. Players will make an agreement with the Athletic Department re extra- curriculars. This specifically includes regular attendance and team conduct as outlined by the coaching staff. This would include practice/game attendance, dress code, conduct on and off the floor, quitting teams, etc. Only those students who are in attendance the day of a sporting event may participate unless otherwise approved. Parents should be aware that students travelling to interscholastic sporting events must use the transportation provided by the school.
